TOBACCO INDUSTRY INTERFERENCE INDEX 2023

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Background and Introduction

Tobacco use is a significant public health issue in Jamaica, with approximately 15% of the population aged 15 and over currently using tobacco products¹. Among males aged 35-44, the rate of tobacco use is as high as 36%, while among females aged 25-34, the rate is 10%². Tobacco is responsible for a significant portion of non-communicable diseases in Jamaica, including 11% of all NCDs and 6% of all cardiovascular diseases³. Furthermore, tobacco use is the leading cause of cancer of the trachea, bronchus, and lung in Jamaica, accounting for 71% of all deaths from this type of cancer⁴.

Despite these alarming statistics, the tobacco industry remains active in Jamaica, with Carreras⁵ (BAT subsidiary) controlling much of the market share as the leading distributor of tobacco products. For many years, Carreras (whose major cigarette brands are Craven A and Matterhorn) and Musson Group Limited, the distributor of Marlboro cigarettes, dominated⁶ the industry, accounting for 99% and 1% of the market share respectively. Recently, companies such as Nostic Agricultural & Manufacturing Limited⁷, Pacific Cigarette Company⁸, and Hamburg International Limited⁹ have entered the market since 2016 and continue to operate to a lesser extent compared to Carreras and Musson Group.

In recent years, there has also been an increase in the availability and use of new tobacco products such as e-cigarettes in the country, with 11.7% of students aged 13-15 reporting using e-cigarettes and 11.2% smoking traditional cigarettes¹⁰. There are numerous vendors providing these products to Jamaican consumers. Two such proprietors are The Mez Vape & Smoke Shop¹¹ and The Vape Shoppe¹². They have contributed to the recent debate on the harmfulness of vaping by maintaining that is harmless¹³ despite emerging data proving otherwise. According to a rapid assessment conducted by the National Council on Drug Abuse in 2022¹⁴, high school children in particular have a concerning ease of accessibility to e-cigarettes hence necessitating the need for strong regulations.

To address the public health threat posed by tobacco use, the Jamaican government, enacted the Public Health (Tobacco Control) Regulations 2013¹⁵. The legislation was amended in 2014 and prohibited smoking in public places and required graphic health warning labels on cigarette packages. Within six years, a Needs Assessment, led by the Convention Secretariat of the WHO/FCTC, PAHO, the UN Country Team and the MOHW informed the proposal of the Tobacco Control Act (2020)¹⁶. The Tobacco Control Bill is currently being reviewed by a joint select committee of Parliament. When passed, the bill will incorporate and strengthen existing tobacco control measures under the Public Health (Tobacco Control) Regulations 2013. The proposed regulations include banning smoking in public places, prohibiting all forms of Tobacco Advertisement, Promotion and Sponsorships (TAPS), and protecting tobacco control policies from interference of the tobacco industry. The Bill will also move closer to satisfying all the obligations of the country in accordance with the WHO FCTC in protecting the present and future generations from the devasting health, social, environmental, and economic consequences of tobacco consumption and exposure to tobacco smoke.

The tobacco industry in Jamaica has also engaged in corporate social responsibility (CSR) activities, including supporting education, environmental initiatives, and Covid-19 related efforts. For example, Carreras has been providing scholarships and financial support to students for almost 60 years¹⁷.

These CSR activities are used to build good will among the public and legislators. The tobacco industry also uses CSR to take advantage of the slow progress of the legislative process. Efforts to promote public health and reduce smoking rates must remain a top priority in Jamaica and around the world.

The report is based on a questionnaire developed by the Southeast Asia Tobacco Control Alliance. There are 20 questions based on the Article 5.3 guidelines. Information used in this report is obtained from the public domain only. A scoring system is applied to make the assessment. The score ranges from 0 - 5, where 5 indicates highest level of industry interference, and 1 is low or no interference. Hence the lower the score, the better for the country. The report includes information on incidents from April 2021 to March 2023, but also includes incidents prior to 2020 that still have relevance today.

Summary Findings

I INDUSTRY PARTICIPATION IN POLICY DEVELOPMENT

The government invited key stakeholders, including the tobacco industry, to make submissions on the Tobacco Control Bill. However, there is no evidence that the government endorsed policies or legislation drafted by or in collaboration with the tobacco industry.

2 INDUSTRY CSR ACTIVITIES

Carreras has conducted multiple CSR activities over the years. These include handing out 90 scholarships worth \$20 million in 2022, contributions towards COVID-19 relief, and a national Labour Day tree-planting project with the Forestry Department. There is clear evidence of the government's involvement in tobacco industry CSR activities in some instances.

3 BENEFITS TO THE INDUSTRY

Deliberations on the Tobacco Control Bill have suffered delays due to numerous postponements, some of which might be attributable to interference from the tobacco industry. Although there was only one instance of mentioning in public space on the part of the Government about attempts from the tobacco industry to request delays in the Tobacco Control Bill, the authors of this document are aware of several occasions wherein the request was made through correspondence to the members of the Joint Select Committee throughout the revision of the Bill. The committee however did not refer to these correspondences when identifying factors contributing to the delays. On balance, the delays have invariably worked to the benefit of the tobacco industry.

4 UNNECESSARY INTERACTION

The authors of this document have reason to believe that the Government, to some extent, fostered questionable relations with the tobacco industry, however there is no record in the public domain. While the government has not fostered any unnecessary interactions with the tobacco industry, the National Insurance Fund is a major shareholder in Carreras. The state-owned pension fund will be obligated to divest its stakes from the tobacco company when the Tobacco Control Bill is enacted.

5 TRANSPARENCY

As part of its non-price demand reduction measures, the government requires the tobacco industry to make annual disclosures of prescribed information to the Minister of Health. These include business contact information, national sales volumes, the distribution and supply chain, ingredients, and product characteristics.

6 CONFLICT OF INTEREST

There appears to be no conflict of interest between the tobacco industry and government officials in the public sphere (recorded or available). While the current legislation does not have any prohibition on contributions from the tobacco industry or related entities to political parties or candidates, the proposed Tobacco Control Act (2020) includes a provision that prohibits individuals employed in public bodies from soliciting or accepting contributions of any kind from the tobacco industry.

7 PREVENTIVE MEASURES

The government has laid the foundation, through the Tobacco Control Bill, for disclosing interaction with the tobacco industry, there is evidence of a draft code of conduct for public officials in their dealings with the tobacco industry, however, there is no evidence of this draft being advanced¹⁸. The tobacco industry is required to provide some information but not all, and there is an inferred commitment to protect tobacco control policies from industry interference. There is no specific policy to disallow contributions from the tobacco industry, but such interactions will be monitored under the proposed Tobacco Control Act (2020).

Recommendations

RECOMMENDATION I

Create a national tobacco control strategy that outlines a clear roadmap for achieving the country's tobacco control objectives. This strategy should outline clear measurable targets (such as mechanisms for enforcement of the tobacco control regulations and a public education campaign), timelines, and indicators for monitoring progress. Additionally, it should be managed by a dedicated team of professionals in the Ministries, Departments and Agencies which are responsible for its implementation to ensure accountability. The national tobacco control strategy should be implemented with 12 months of the enactment of the proposed Tobacco Control Act (2020) and should be reviewed and updated regularly to maintain relevance.

RECOMMENDATION 2

Enact the proposed Tobacco Control Act (2020) that prohibits individuals employed in public bodies from soliciting or accepting contributions of any kind from the tobacco industry. The Bill should also be strengthened by requiring the tobacco industry to disclose more information about affiliated organizations and prohibiting the tobacco industry from making political contributions. This should be done by the end of 2023 and should be accompanied by public awareness

campaigns to educate the public and stakeholders about the key elements of the new legislation.

RECOMMENDATION 3

Revise and implement the code of conduct for all public officials (with respect to Article 5.3 of the FCTC) in their dealings with the tobacco industry, including clear guidelines on how to handle conflicts of interest. This should be implemented within 12 months of the enactment of the proposed Tobacco Control Act (2020) and should be accompanied by mandatory training for all public officials to ensure effectiveness.

RECOMMENDATION 4

Develop and implement a monitoring and evaluation system to track progress on the implementation and enforcement of the proposed Tobacco Control Act (2020) and other related policies. This system should be in place by the end of 2023 and should be reviewed and updated annually with evidence-based data to ensure accuracy and credibility. This system would be useful in proving suitable background information on the efficacy of tobacco control measures in Jamaica.

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tertiary students over the past four years. They provided 56 scholarships³² valued at over \$15 million in 2021. In 2022, they issued 90 scholarships valued at approximately \$20 million. They hosted an award ceremony and brunch in January 2023, in attendance and delivering the keynote speech, was the Acting Chief Education Officer at the Ministry of Education and Youth, Dr Kasan Troupe³³.

Carreras claimed to have donated \$9.5M to government COVID-19 relief program³⁴³⁵. The then, Carreras' Managing Director, Raoul Glynn participated in the distribution of food packages in Central Village, Spanish Town. The Private Sector Organization of Jamaica (PSOJ), Council on Voluntary Social Services, United Way of Jamaica, and American Friends of Jamaica were named as organizations managing the funds and the initiative. Jamaica, through the Ministry of Finance and the Public Service (MOFPS), had launched the COVID-19 Allocation of Resources for Employees ("CARE") Programme³⁶ in April 2020, however; none of the entities outlined by Carreras were identified as partners to the CARE programme. The CARE programme was funded by the Government (from Government taxes) and managed by the MOFPS³⁷. Despite Carreras claiming to have donated funds to the government's COVID-19 relief program³⁸ within one month of its launch, no evidence was found on the part of the MOFPS refuting Carreras' claim. Further search of the PSOJ website which contribute to the management of the fund that Carreras donated the sum of \$9.5M revealed that the Jamaica Constabulary Force (JCF) and Jamaica Defense Force (JDF) were named among the partners to the Fund³⁹. The JCF and JDF led the delivery and distribution of relief packages to those in need. Members of the ICF are captured in photos beside the Managing Director of Carreras delivering packages to citizens in need during the Pandemic⁴⁰.

A newspaper article published May 24, 2022 highlighted Carreras' Labour Day Tree Planting Project⁴¹. The company pledged to plant 900 fruit and ornamental trees in the areas between Rae Town and Rockfort in Kingston with the help of the Forestry Department and the Government's Housing, Opportunity, Production and Employment (HOPE) programme which was launched by the Prime Minister in 2017⁴². No evidence was found from these departments denying a partnership with Carreras on its Labour Day tree planting project.

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Carreras was mentioned as one of the partners in the national tree planting project led by the Forestry department⁴³. The Most Honorable Prime Minister Andrew Holness, on October 4, 2019 launched the National Tree Planting Initiative to plant three million trees in three years was launched by. The objective of the Initiative was to support national development in the areas of climate change and reforestation efforts to increase forest cover and establish high value urban green spaces for all Jamaicans. The Forestry Department led the implementation of the initiative with one of the objectives being to produce and plant 1.3 million seedlings through partnerships. On National Tree Planting Day- October 11, 2022, the department announced that 11,000 trees were planted through partnerships with several groups and organizations- Carreras ltd. being among those listed.

The Early Childhood Commission (ECC) which is an agency of the Ministry of Education, coordinates all activities, development plans and programmes within the early childhood sector. A search of the website revealed a list of its local and international partners; among those listed was Crayons Count/ Do Good Jamaica⁴⁴ - a non-government organization. Crayons Count is one of the major projects of the charitable organization Do Good Jamaica which is a campaign to support early childhood education in Jamaica⁴⁵. The Crayons Count Project acknowledges the endorsement of the ECC on its website. The project began in 2011 and continues up to the time of preparing this report; the campaign activities have switched focus⁴⁶ to providing specialized resources to students. Mr. Novar Patrick McDonald, a director at Carreras⁴⁷ is listed as the director of Do Good Jamaica in his biographic information on Carreras' website. His involvement in the Crayons Count project or any other project affiliated with Do Good Jamaica could not be assessed.

The JCF collaborated with the PSOJ on a social and economic development initiative called Project STAR (Social Transformation and Renewal)⁴⁸. The goal of the initiative is to bring about societal transformation through targeted interventions in under-resourced areas of Jamaica. Project STAR consults with local communities to identify needs which are addressed through collaboration with its partners to implement sustainable solutions. In an article published on May, 5, 2023 Sandals Foundation was highlighted as the most recent partner⁴⁹, committing JMD \$50M. Further investigation revealed that the tobacco industry has played a major role in Project STAR. Carreras and Musson limited are recorded among the list of partners⁵⁰ to project STAR. In addition to the JCF, other government agencies are affiliated⁵¹ with the initiative through the

012345Social Development Commission⁵² (an agency of the Ministry of Local Government & Rural
Development) and the Violence Prevention Alliance⁵³ (which is a coalition of various organizations
including the Ministry of Health and Wellness, Ministry of National Security, Ministry of Education,
Youth & Information, Ministry of Labour and Social Security and others aimed at creating safe
communities in Jamaica). The initiative continues to grow as an article published on June 15, 2023
indicated that "The Government of Jamaica has thrown its support behind Project STAR by
making available representatives of key government ministries, departments and agencies to
provide technical guidance to the project through a Technical Stakeholder Working Group."54

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INDICATOR 3: Benefits to the Tobacco Industry

6. The government accommodates requests from the tobacco industry for a longer time frame for implementation or postponement of tobacco control law.

During the review of the Tobacco Control Bill by the Joint Select Committee (JSC), the deliberations suffered delays on numerous occasions. According to a letter to the editor of one of the local newspapers, the delays "have significantly lengthened the timeline of the overall process" ⁵⁶. The sittings of the JSC were often postponed upon short notice, leading to lengthy breaks between meetings. The deliberations were expected to conclude at the end of 2022, followed by its submission to Parliament and ultimate enactment. During one of these sittings⁵⁷ (August 30, 2022) the chairman of the joint select committee (Minister of Health and Wellness, Dr the hon Christopher Tufton) and another member of the committee indicated having been written by Carreras. They requested a meeting to further discuss with the committee to consider its

recommendations during the ongoing review. Following the meeting on August 30th two more meetings were held on October 4th and 13th. After the meeting on October 13, 2022 the last two meetings which were scheduled for November 2nd and 4th were postponed to November 29th and December 8th. Those meetings were later postponed until further notice; the meetings did not resume until March 16, 2023 whereby another postponement had occurred on March 7^{th58}. There were no other public mention of Carreras corresponding with the JSC however, the authors of this report are aware of two more incidents wherein Carreras wrote to the JSC requesting that the deliberations be postponed until its positions were carefully considered.

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At the meeting held on March 16, 2023, the committee remarked on some of the challenges which contribute to the delays in the deliberations namely, a systemic lack of priority for health-related legislation and poor inter-agency coordination⁵⁹. Following this meeting a letter to the editor⁶⁰ at one of the local newspapers was published criticizing the Minister of Health and Wellness for wanting to "rush through the legislation without due care". The extent to which the letters from Carreras contributed to the delays in the legislative process was difficult to assess but cannot be ignored.

7.	The government gives privileges, incentives, tax			
	exemptions or benefits to the tobacco industry.			

The last decision by the Government regarding tax on tobacco products was in 2017 when the Special Consumption Tax (SCT) per stick on tobacco and tobacco products, was increased to \$17 per stick from \$14 per stick. There has been no tax increase since then.

In 2016, Carreras began a court enquiry regarding a customs refund on goods which it contends that despite not having submitted the required documentation before removal of the products, it had provided sufficient documentation to the Jamaica Customs Agency (JCA) to prove that the goods were sold duty-free to customers. In December 2020, the Supreme Court declared that the JCA acted unreasonably toward Carreras in its decision to apply a customs duty levy in 2015. The JCA has since however hesitated to pay over the \$58.38 million ordered by the Supreme Court and is consulting lawyers to ascertain an appropriate response⁶¹.

The government allows international travellers to bring duty free 200 cigarettes or 50 cigars or 230 grams of other tobacco products into the country⁶².
